Task 3: Forgetfulness – what do experts have to say?

Teachers everywhere report that students' ability to retain and remember information is terrible. Some of them feel that students are not familiar with rote memorization, which is a learning technique based on repeating certain facts over and over again, until they are stored in our memory. We have talked to six experts about the factors that are responsible for the epidemic of forgetfulness in American classrooms.

EXPERT1

In recent years, assignments and activities that focus on rote memorization have been replaced with ones that promise to promote higher-order thinking. So-called "choke and puke" learning (due to the idea that students swallow information and bring it back up for a test) is often seen as old-fashioned and meaningless. Students learn something, use the information maybe once or twice, then simply erase it from their memory.

EXPERT2

Opponents of rote memorization argue that students don't retain much of what they learn, and that real-world learning should be more about problem-solving than about memorizing. However, memorizing poems, multiplication tables, lists of presidents, state capitals or definitions exercises the brain and frees up space in the brain's working memory. By reducing the amount of memorization required of children, we, both teachers and parents, do not prepare them enough to become critical thinkers.

EXPERT3

We, as teachers, cannot overstate the negative effects of too much screen time on the developing brain. Too much time spent playing games, scrolling social media, and watching 20-second video clips, literally alters the gray matter and white volumes in the brain and makes storing of information and new knowledge in the brain difficult. Besides that, many young people are sleep-deprived because they are too addicted to their digital devices to turn them off and go to bed.

EXPERT4

My students seem to think that rather than sending anything to our memory, all information can be found on Google. To be honest, I too am guilty of letting technology be my brain. I can still tell you the phone number of the boy I had a crush on in the 7th grade, but I do not know the phone numbers of any of my best friends today. In my defense, my brain was already fully developed when I got my first smartphone. I feel that kids today aren't just choosing not to store or remember information – they don't even realize that's an option.

EXPERT5

Our students don't have to memorize anything for homework - parents can always check their folder, or better yet, email the teacher. And if they forget their lunch or their basketball shoes, someone will drop everything and bring it to them.

This isn't to say that parents should never bail their kids out. I've made more than one trip home during my own break to grab a forgotten lunchbox and drop it off at my children's school. But kids need to learn to take responsibility for remembering what needs to be done

and when. As parents and teachers, we should help their brains to develop so that they can learn, remember, think, and create.

EXPERT6

Many parents and teachers are not sure what can be done to promote healthy brain development in our children and students. A simple and concrete measure might be to encourage and require memorization from them in everyday situations; for example, ask them to remember a few items on a shopping list. Others could include limiting screen time and holding kids more accountable for what they need to do and when. These will all go a long way toward helping our kids become the people they are meant to be.

Task 8 – Why an asteroid on a collision course with Earth is actually good for humanity

A gigantic rock is hurtling towards Earth. Travelling 20 times faster than a bullet, *Asteroid 2024 YR4* has a 2.3 *0) <u>per</u>* cent chance of hitting us in 2032, roughly the same probability as rolling double sixes on a pair of dice.

These newly revised odds have made it the biggest extra-terrestrial threat to our planet since 2004. That space rock eventually proved harmless, but if we're lucky, this newly-discovered one will be on a direct collision course **1**) _____ Earth.

This is not a wish for an apocalypse; the potential impact of *Asteroid 2024 YR4* would be catastrophic - if it crashed into a densely populated city like Lagos or Kolkata – which **2)** ______ both on its estimated flight path, tens of millions of people might die or be displaced. It is, instead, a hope that humanity will be able to show just how far we've come as a species, giving an opportunity to demonstrate that we can now determine **3)** ______ own fate – and alter the course of the universe. While the asteroid's exact route is uncertain, the chances of dealing with it are already known - we have the technology to deflect it.

The Double Asteroid Redirection Test saw a spacecraft intentionally collide with an asteroid twice the size of *Asteroid 2024 YR4*. This first-of-its-kind attempt altered the orbital path of *Didymos*, with the mission proving to be **4**) _____ a success that even the live stream didn't fail.

It was not just a technological triumph, NASA described the ability to see off asteroids as "a new era of humankind", showing that it is possible to go **5**) ______ warring tribes to a civilisation capable of planet-wide cooperation.

There is nothing like a planetary threat to bring the world **6**) ______. Ranking as a three on the Torino Impact Hazard Scale, *Asteroid 2024 YR4* has triggered global planetary defence procedures for the first time in human history.

This has become a moment to share resources and knowledge, and take collective action **7)** ______ an existential threat. If it can be achieved with an asteroid, then similar levels of cooperation and organisation could potentially be extended to global challenges like climate change and the appearance of superhuman AI.

This may not be true for all asteroids. The early discovery of *Asteroid 2024 R4* gives us seven years to prepare for its approach – something that may not be the case for **8**) ______. As astrophysicist and YouTuber Scott Manley noted last week, the current impact risk of this asteroid is still lower than the odds of a similar-sized undiscovered object hitting Earth before then.

Well, for at least this one, we have the chance to work as a team to prevent a cosmic disaster.
