

Homeschooling has witnessed significant growth in recent years with the COVID-19 pandemic. The global shift to remote learning revealed challenges in traditional schooling, including the difficulty of replicating hands-on activities like science experiments and art projects, which affected student engagement and comprehension. Remote learning also led to increased stress and anxiety, as parents struggled to balance work and supervise their children. These challenges prompted many families to seek alternative education methods, including homeschooling. Surveys, such as those conducted by the *National Home Education Research Institute*, highlight dissatisfaction with traditional school environments and a desire for personalized learning as key motivators for the switch.

One of the people who have chosen this type of education, Simon, a father of two teens from Florida, shared how his wife and he incorporate topics like artificial intelligence, art, and travel into their curriculum – subjects they believe traditional schools often overlook. Additionally, they avoid strict schedules that require early wake-ups which, Simon argues, negatively impact children's health and growth. Contrary to the misconception that homeschooling limits social opportunities, families often join collaboration classes, attend community events, or participate in extracurricular activities. Simon shared that his local homeschool group meets weekly for play and socialization, which fosters meaningful relationships and provides parents with a supportive network.

Advocates for homeschooling often point to data supporting its benefits. For example, *The National Assessment of Educational Progress* found that many U.S. students struggle with reading proficiency, with 40% classified as nonreaders. Some families see homeschooling as a way to address this gap more effectively and when it comes to grading, parents assess their children's progress through methods such as portfolio reviews, standardized tests, and project-based evaluations, offering a holistic view of academic growth.

Cash Daniels, a 14-year-old homeschooler from Tennessee, tells how flexibility allows students to pursue unique interests. As founder of *The CleanUp Kids*, a conservation nonprofit, Cash perfectly balances schoolwork and business activities. His homeschooling schedule enables him to attend events, manage his organization, and maintain an active social life through swim practices and other group activities.

Homeschooling has also empowered students to explore running a business. During the pandemic, Anvi Saxena, a Dallas teen, embraced the homeschooling flexible structure to focus on her passion for dance. She used her flexible schedule to plan and launch a home-based studio, teaching various dance styles to local students. Running the business taught her practical skills, such as managing finances and working with diverse individuals.

After eventually returning to traditional school, Anvi found it challenging to adjust to the structured schedule and homework demands. However, thanks to her homeschooling experience, she was taught efficiency and time management, enabling her to balance school with her business. Buckingham Palace is no stranger to visitors. This came as quite a surprise as the press soon found out that it wasn't the first time the same man entered the palace illegally using a similar method.
